INVOLVEMENT IN THE CHALLENGES OF DEMOGRAPHIC TRANSITIONS

One of the key challenges facing France and the European Union are the demographic transitions represented by the extension of adult life into the «fourth age», and the shift in the age structure of the population towards the oldest groups. With a view to developing appropriate responses to the issues and opportunities raised by these population trends, France's Ministry of Higher Education and Research called on France's research institutions to coordinate their teams working on ageing. The response was the implementation of the multi-organisation Research Network on Longevity and Ageing, led by CNRS, INSERM, INED, Paris-Dauphine University and CNAV. The network was created by the CNRS on 1 January 2014 for a period of four years, and given the provisional title of «Opportunities and challenges raised by the extension of longevity and the reconfiguration of the life cycle of the population of Europe».



THREE OBJECTIVES

1. STRENGTHEN the French human and social science research community working on issues related to ageing, by encouraging inter-disciplinary collaboration between existing teams of demographers, economists, epidemiologists, geographers, lawyers, psychologists, sociologists, town planners and others.

2. MAXIMISE the participation of French teams in European programmes (Horizon 2020 or the More Years, Better Lives joint programming initiative) as well as national programmes by providing targeted information and actions for the research community.

3. EXPAND the use and analysis of existing European databases such as the Survey on Health, Ageing and Retirement in Europe (SHARE), the Generations and Gender Programme (GGP) and the European Health and Life Expectancy Information System (EHLEIS).

WHY JOIN THE NETWORK?

Access targeted information

A newsletter on ageing research, produced jointly with CNAV, is sent out three times a year. With support from INED, a web portal will enable participants to access resources and work produced by the human and social science teams working on old age and ageing.

Assistance with submitting projects in response to calls for projects

The network holds dedicated seminars for research teams on submitting joint proposals in response to national or European calls for projects.

Research days

The network organises days where researchers can meet and discuss fundamental issues such as life stage management, life pathways, inter-generational ties, senior workers, pensions, the role of seniors in society, functional decline and loss of autonomy, and elder care in France and Europe. There are thematic half-days where researchers can share experiences and methods beyond their own disciplinary fields. Other events are held to present major European resources to French researchers and encourage more research based on those resources.
